The Year Behind Us

Sometimes it feels like these annual reports come every other month, time moves so quickly these days. But they don't—it's really been a whole year since the last one—and 2012 was mostly a good one for Wildlife Rescue and the animals we've cared for. Here are some of the highlights.

- After submitting a grant request to the foundation funded by Bob Barker, I received a call from him. We had asked for less than five thousand dollars for equipment for our animal hospital surgical unit and he was intrigued. He told me he had called people in the animal world all around the country and heard nothing but praise for Wildlife Rescue—a rarity in this realm, he said, and I had to agree. He wondered if we could use \$250,000, to which you can imagine my response. This was one of the greatest gifts we have ever received and, beside the dollars, I am more happy than I know how to say that WRR's accomplishments have been noted by so many.
- The WRR Sherman Animal Care Complex in San Antonio is thriving, with the vast majority of rescued animals coming through there. The immediate care given means more animals survive.
- Congressman Lamar Smith's ranch south of San Antonio has become a major site for release of rehabilitated wildlife. Mr. Smith clearly enjoys helping us make a good life possible for these animals, and we appreciate his kindness and enthusiasm.
- With help from the Myra Stafford Pryor Charitable Trust we have intensified our efforts to "green" Wildlife Rescue. The Trust funded the installation of a wind turbine for electricity generation, and if it makes the difference we think it will we hope to install more as we go along. We also have 30,000 gallons of rainwater collection capacity and are looking at other ways to conserve water and collect our shrinking rainwater supplies.
- On a sad note, the year saw us lose several of our long time members, some of whom have stood beside me and Wildlife Rescue since its beginning. With their usual kindness, they remembered the animals in their final act of generosity. I will always remember them because without them I don't know how WRR could have survived in the "hard ole days."



So, like most years, I guess, it was a mix of good and satisfying times with some that were hard and brought me grief. But our work goes on, and I treasure that along with the support of all our loyal members.
